LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



Dear Fellow Racquet Club Members,

I have been on the job for about six months now as President of the Board of Governors, with much of that time spent learning about the Club's operations, management, history, relationships, as well as member aspirations and goals for the Club. While much has been familiar through more than a dozen years of membership and stints on the House Committee and Board, the hands-on demands of this new position have heightened my awareness.

We have a great management team in place, led by our GM Derik Comalli. I have been impressed by the team's enthusiasm and desire to improve the Club experience of our members. While I am extremely fond of many of the traditions of the Club and

believe that they are an important dimension of what makes our Club unique and attractive, it is important for us to continually explore ways that we can evolve, adapt and refine what the Club offers its members. It is an ongoing challenge to find that balance between maintaining the character and traditions that have developed over our 125+ years and the imperative to remain relevant and attractive as a 21st Century destination. Complacency is toxic to the success of a modern club.

The cornerstone of the RCOP is not the building – magnificent though it is – but our membership. This is your club. We want to encourage you to feel a sense of ownership in your club, replete with all the possibilities for programming and services that can be leveraged from the facility and its staff, as well as the responsibilities that come with ownership.

If you have an interest in fostering a particular activity or interest group, we want to hear from you and see if we can help support such an initiative. So, for example, if you would like to start a monthly Italian conversation group, let us see if we can help make that a reality. We can help you publicize the group, find the right accommodations, and perhaps even work with our Food & Beverage staff to curate a dining experience with Italian food and wine offerings to accompany your gathering. If you want to have a book club, a political discussion group, or some gathering of hobbyists, consider the possibility of reserving a table in the Gold Leaf Café for a regularly scheduled lunch with your fellow aficionados. I'm sure that there are many other worthwhile ideas that we can help support, but it's up to our members to seize the opportunity to explore the possibilities. I strongly encourage you to consider your Club as a resource beyond a place to play racquet sports or work out.

With respect to the notion of "responsibilities of ownership," I am not referring to the duty of care and civility that we as members of course deploy when we are in the clubhouse and among our fellow members and their guests. Rather, since becoming president, I have been reminded often of the enormous amount of talent and expertise that our members have acquired over the course of their lives. You are a potentially valuable resource to the club because of your skills and experience. I have encouraged our staff to help us develop an inventory of the human assets that reside in our membership. I encourage you to provide us with this information so that we can understand the full extent of your abilities and experience that may be of benefit to the Club. The idea is that we have a resource that we can use from time to time to identify someone who may be able to assist us with an issue or project that is within the proverbial "wheelhouse" of a particular member.

Currently, a significant number of your fellow members regularly volunteer at the Board and Committee level to help maintain and improve the operations of the Club. We have architects and engineers (and others), involved with our House Committee in oversight of building renovations and capital projects. Lawyers, accountants, and bankers help evaluate financial software, benefits, and insurance issues.

We undoubtedly have members with talents in marketing, outreach, and public relations, for example, who could make valuable contributions to the Club.

Others have expertise in history and the arts and could contribute fresh ideas to enhance the experience we derive from our collection of art and historical artifacts, many of which are not currently on display. For instance, is there someone who might wish to update the history of the Club, last done by John McFadden and published in 1989?

These are just some examples and ideas of areas and projects that could allow the Club to benefit from the talents of its members. I hope that his note inspires you to become more involved and gets you to think about leveraging your membership in the Racquet Club to the fullest extent possible. CAMERON ELLIS

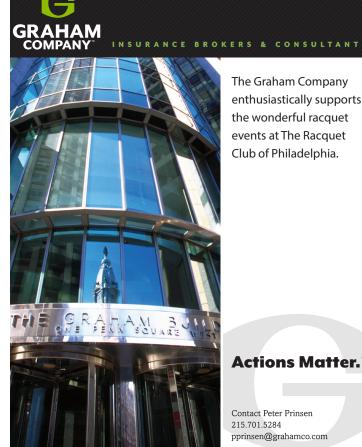

New Doubles Squash Courts

Led by a meaningful gift from a long-time Life Member of the Club, The RC Fund was able to provide the additional funding to replace the Doubles Squash Court floor in September. This Life Member's gift, combined with a modest portion of the resources provided by generous annual gifts from the donors to The RC Fund, enabled our non-profit to complete the second project following the installation of Specter Courts. The Racquet Club of Philadelphia has long hosted top flight Amateur and Professional events allowing the Philadelphia squash community to view the game played at the highest levels. Of equal importance, the courts are also used to facilitate development programs for youth from the local area during the athletic season.

The Racquet Club is the home to the world's first doubles squash court, which is a game that was invented within these historic walls back in 1907 by the club's first head professional, Frederick Tompkins. With such annals, the project's completion serves to secure the history of the game at The Racquet Club. Additionally, the doubles squash court serves as a vital location for our youth programming efforts. The court is often utilized between November and February to support The Racquet Club's youth program, in which our dedicated professionals build character and merit through the lessons of squash to the children of two different local schools. The preservation of the doubles squash court is crucial to the ongoing success of this program.

The \$20,000 project was completed in mid-September and left. The RC Fund with a balance of approximately \$66,000 to be used for other worthwhile projects that align with The Fund's mission. The RC Fund's annual appeal has been emailed and mailed to all members and tax deductible contributions are highly encouraged to support important ongoing renovations such as the Doubles Squash Court.

The Racquet Club is home to many fine pieces of art work that can be found throughout the Clubhouse. Each quarter, we will highlight an interesting piece of art so our members can learn more about the magnificent sculptures, paintings, and prints that are on display.

Featured:

"Mountain Stream Landscape with Shepherdess and Heather in Foreground"

Artist:

William Didier-Pouget

Location:

South wall - Main Dining Room

Description:

William Didier-Pouget was a French artist, born in 1864, Toulouse, France, known for his landscape paintings. He focused primarily on the countryside of southern France, infusing his landscapes. He studied under Amedee Baudit (1825-1890) and Louis-Auguste Augin (1824-1904) and Maxime Lalanne (1827-1886).

Didier-Puget was considered a first class artist and earned a plethora of prizes and medals. His work is featured in museums in Paris, Leipzig, Montpellier, New Orleans, London, and New York.



This painting was completed in 1906, and it was thought for many years that the scene was that of the Delaware Water Gap in the Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania. Others argued that it was a scene in Scotland or Switzerland though it has been authenticated by an appraiser of impeccable credentials that the landscape is in fact located in the artist's native France.

The painting was donated to The Racquet Club by George Dunton Widener, the former Finance Chairman of the Club who chose the plot of the current clubhouse located in 1906 and hired Horace Trumbauer as the architect to design the structure. In 1912, George D. Widener, his wife, and their son Harry traveled to Paris, France, with original intentions to find a chef for Widener's new Philadelphia hotel, The Ritz Carlton. The Wideners booked their return passage on RMS Titanic. After the ship struck an iceberg, Widener placed his wife and her maid in a lifeboat. The women were rescued by the steamship RMS Carpathia, but George D. Widener and his son Harry both went down with the ship.
